

We elected Miss Erickson and Mr. Barber as our sponsors. We went through Freshmen initiation as good little children, and had fun being poodle dogs for the upper classmen.

Then as Sophomores, there were thirty-seven. During this year we elected Mr. Barber and Miss Montgomery as our sponsors.

Ah ! Juniors ! A class of twenty-nine. Again Mr. Barber and Miss Montgomery were our sponsors. We presented <u>An All American Family</u> as our class play. The following made up the cast. Mary Lou Luck, Genevieve Hightower, Hubert Burkes, Bob Harcrow, Grover Hightower, Violet Triplett, Charlotte Rose, Betty McClellan, Fred Sweet, and Livorio Silva, sponsored by Miss Montgomery. However, no one was seriously injured and we successfully presented the play. We gave the Seniors of 1941 a banquet and prom, in Spanish-American style.

Now, in our last year at Capitan High School, there are twenty-two graduates. Again we have Mr. Barber as our sponsor. We wish to thank Mr. Barber for his cooperation in the past four years, and we are proud to have kept him for our four years spent in Capitan High. This year Miss Chilson is our assistant sponsor, and we wish to give her credit for the wonderful work in producing the Senior play, <u>The High School Mystery</u>. The cast was as follows: Violet Triplett, Mary Elizabeth Hall, Lawrence Hefner, Lawrence Peebles, Bob Harcrow, Livorio Silva, Junior Perry and John Hale. The play, the greatest mystery that has ever been produced, was given on April 24.

On the night of May 26 we will bid farewell to the school we have loved and the memories of our "Capitan High School Days" will linger on forever.

In September, 1941, forty-eight freshmen entered the portals of Capitan High School to struggle with a little higher education. Capitan High School, the greatest contributor, sent us nineteen: Lincoln did their part with eight; Ft. Stanton managed six; Stetson sent us five; Roswell, three; Encinoso, two; and Tularosa, Oscuro, Ruidoso, Hondo and Carrizozo one each. They didn't feel as if they really belonged here until after September 20 when they were initiated by the usual procedure of white washing the "C" on Wilson Hill, and performing in assembly.

Sometime during the course of the year seven freshmen left to continue their careers elsewhere, and now there is a total membership of 41 in the class.

Miss Wilkenson, Freshmen class sponsor, helped acquaint the class with their new surroundings, and assisted them throughout the year with their class activities.

They presented instrumental solos, small I groups, and the faculty quartette assisted the band by singing.

The Band also worked on elementary marching. Along with the band we have four baton twirlers.

The Band had 29 members at the close of the school year.

The High School Girls' Glee Club, under the direction of Mrs. Louise Hurd, has during the year, presented one major performance, an Operetta, <u>Bits O' Blarney</u>. The Glee Club, in producing the operetta, was assisted by Mr. Williams, Mr. Teghtmeyer, Mr. Knudsen, and a group of boys from the high school. Mary Elizabeth Hall, Tommy Burleson, Fern Shaw, Seldon Burkes and Lawrence Hefner had the leading parts, and the operetta was proclaimed a success. Most of our practice, which is one hour three days a week, is taken, up with the study and rendition of good choral music for the purpose of enlarging our repertoire and for our own

An innovation at Capitan High School this year was the formation of a student council representing the associated student body. Each of the six classes chose a boy and a girl to meet with Mr. Knudsen to draw up a constitution. Many interesting meetings were held, in which student council constitutions of other high schools were studied. Critical and analytical articles from leading educational magazines were presented by different members. Upon the competition of the constitution it was ratified by a large majority of the student body. The elected officers owed their election in large part to the spirited rally carried on by their backers.

Some of the activities sponsored by the council includes: dancing during the noon hour, encouraging the purchase of defense stamps, greater participation and interest in softball, tennis, horseshoes, and other out-of-door sports.

The accomplishments have indeed been small; but the potentialities are commensurate with the ability and willingness of future students to share in the ability responsibility of making our school life more enjoyable by joint planning between students and faculty. "C" Club:

SENIOR CLASS HISTORY



JUNIORS





Sometime during the course of the year seven freshmen left to continue their careers elsewhere, and now there is a total membership of 41 in the class.



GIRLS ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION






